## How to get to the Woolcock Institute of Medical Research

### Address

Level 5, 431 Glebe Point Road, Glebe NSW 2037

### Location

Woolcock Institute of Medical Research is located on the Corner of Glebe Point Road and Leichhardt Street, Glebe. The nearest cross streets are Cotter Lane and Leichhardt Street. We are conveniently an approximate 25 minutes drive from Sydney Airport and 10 -15 minutes drive from the CBD. Wheelchair access is available via the Ground Level lift.



### Parking

On street 2 hour parking is available in the neighbouring streets.

### Public Transport:

We are easily accessible by bus and light rail. The bus stop is directly outside our front entrance and the light rail station is within ten minutes walk.

### Light Rail:

The Metro Light Rail runs from Central Station to Glebe. The closest stations are 'Glebe' and 'Jubilee'.

### Bus:
